For A Child Has Been Born For Us

Christmas calls us to place our faith not in power or false gospels,
but in Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace

Every Christmas, I find myself returning to Isaiah's promise of the coming Christ. Isaiah's words never fail to stir my emotions about the birth of the Jesus Child, but this year feels especially alive. They speak to the moment we are living in with urgency, clarity, and most importantly, hope.

Here is what Isaiah says:

For a child has been born for us, A son is given to us. Authority rests upon his shoulders; And he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.

Isaiah goes on to describe the kingdom this child will bring: "He will establish and uphold it with justice and righteousness from this time onward and forever more."

Jesus Christ came for us. He came to save the human race, not by domination or fear, but through love and self-giving. And he comes not only *to us*, but to be *with us*. He calls us to participate in the work of righteousness and peace. That conviction always grounds me at Christmas time. But this time, I feel it even more deeply.

The language of kings and kingdoms may feel antiquated to modern ears. But the concept of power has never disappeared. As my wife, Rev. Joy Carroll, has preached in the past, "put Herod back into Christmas." The ruling King Herod represented the Roman Empire and was actually responsible for Mary and Joseph traveling to a manger in Bethlehem for the birth of the baby Jesus. Alternative "kings" always rise, claiming authority that belongs to God alone. These false kings demand loyalty and obedience and enforce their power through fear. They promise security while grasping for total control, like we are witnessing now.

To those rulers who seek absolute power, I say this December 25th and every day, that I believe in Jesus Christ and I submit my life to his authority above any and all others.

To those who preach false gospels that sanctify domination and excuse injustice, I say that I will celebrate the coming of Christ and the true teachings of Jesus instead.

And to the loved ones I hold close this Christmas week, I will point them to the one Isaiah foretold—the child born for us, whose reign is marked not by force, but by justice, righteousness, and peace.

May Jesus Christ come among us, again and again, especially now.

Precious Lord, Take My Hand

Thomas Dorsey, a jazz musician from Atlanta, made a bold decision in 1926 to leave behind secular music and devote his talent to writing songs for the Lord. But following that call wasn't easy. During the Great Depression, many church leaders criticized his soulful gospel style, calling it "the devil's music." Dorsey later joked, "I got kicked out of some of the best churches in the land."

Then, in 1932, tragedy struck. While in St. Louis for a revival, he received a telegram that his wife had died suddenly during childbirth. His faith was shaken to the core, and grief nearly silenced him. Yet in his deepest sorrow, Dorsey turned back to what he knew best — music. Out of that heartbreak came one of the most beloved hymns of all time:

"Precious Lord, take my hand,

Lead me on, let me stand.

I am tired, I am weak, I am worn... "

Dorsey's song reminds us that even in our valleys, God is near — guiding us, strengthening us, and using our pain to comfort others who walk the same road.
